Organization of the Louisiana Branch Sons of the American Revolution.

BATON ROUGE, La., May 15.—[Special.]—Colonel W. H. Jack of Natchitoches reached here last night. Rutland of Baton Rouge, chaplain; Lieutenant Governor Jeffries, Speaker Henry, Senator Seip, Hon. G. W. Bolton of Rapides, Andrew H. Gay, Senator Prescott of St. Landry, Hon. Euclid Borland of Orleans, Representative B. F. Jenkins of DeSoto, Judge Wm. Duncan of Baton Rouge and Colonel Jack were elected delegates to the annual convention of the national society.
