ARTICLE I.

The purposes and objects of this Corporation are hereby dec-

lared and specified to be: Historical inquiry into the facts connected with THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION of Seventeen hundred and seventy six (1776) and of the Officers, Soldiers and Sailors who served in the American War of the Revolution; to encourage and promote a knowledge and love of the Constitution of the United States of America and institutions established thereunder and of the lives of the Framers thereof; To perpuate thememory of the men, who, by their services or sacrifices during the War of the American Revolution achieved the Independence of the American People; to promote fellowship among their descendants; to inspire them and the community at large with a more profound reverence for the principles of the government formed by our forefathers; to encourage historical research in relation to the Revolution; to acquire and preserve the records of the individual service of the patriots of the War, as well as Documents, relics and land-marks; to mark the scenes of the Revolution by appropriate memorials; to celebrate the anniversaries of the prominent events of the war; to foster true patriotism; to maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom; and to carry out the purposes expression the Preamble to the Constitution of our Country, and the injunctions of Washington in his farewell address to the American People. -

tion and laws of the United States, to the Constitution of this State
or to this instrument upon which it is formed and established.
ARTICLE IX.

The amount of the fees , dues and assessments of each member
as well as the time and menner of collecting shall be fixed by this
Corporation in the by-laws to be hereafter adopted, and no member
shall be liable or responsible for the contracts of faults of this
Corporation in any further sum than the unpaid balance due this
Corporation by him, for fees, dues and assessments.
